HARRY T. BURLEIGH OBSERVANCE AND MUSICAL COLLABORATION WITH SKIDMORE COLLEGE

Bethesda is joining with Skidmore College to observe the 150th anniversary of the birth of Harry Burleigh, one of America's foremost African American composer/arrangers, whose musical roots trace to Saratoga Springs and this parish. A new pamphlet summarizing Burleigh's Roots in Bethesda and Saratoga Springs is now available in the Narthex. The schedule for the Burleigh celebration is:

12:15 p.m. to 1:15 p.m. "Blacks in Saratoga Springs: Then and Now" Brown bag lecture by Myra Young Armstead (Bard College). Zankel Music Center Room 117.

7:00 p.m. Pre-concert talk by Jean Snyder, author of "Harry T. Burleigh: from the Spiritual to the Harlem Renaissance." Zankel Music Center, Ladd Recital Hall.

8:00 p.m. Recital featuring the music of Burleigh with baritone Stephen Salters and pianist Linda Osborn. Also featuring the Skidmore Vocal Chamber Ensemble, Katie Gardiner, Director, with singers from Bethesda. Ladd Recital Hall. \$8 adults; \$5 faculty/staff and seniors; students and children free. Salters sings "like God on a good day... intensely imaginative and adventurous" (Washington Post).

Saturday December 3

3:00 p.m. Bethesda's annual Service of Advent Lessons and Carols at Bethesda will feature singing by Stephen Salters, along with several pieces by Burleigh.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN NEWS

If you are visiting for the first time, or are new to Bethesda, here is your chance to learn about our building plans and capital campaign.

Child care and community-based services will be the theme of Bethesda's New Parish House and Community Center, planned for the lot adjacent to the church immediately to the west. The services housed will provide early childhood education to children from low income families, day care for working parents (fee based on ability to pay) and other community focused services. If any parishioners are aware of a regional non-profit agency seeking new office space, please contact Gordon Boyd.

The Capital Campaign has concluded the 'pledge phase' well above our expectations for the congregation. Now begins the "pledge fulfillment" phase. Reminders, with prayerful gratitude, will soon go out to all who pledged reminding them of the timetable for sending in their donations.

For those seeking more information, architectural renderings are on an easel in the Narthex. Pledge and donation packages are available at the back of the church. Questions may be directed to Dean Vang, or to Mary Withington and Gordon Boyd, co-chairs of the Capital Campaign.

BUILDING NEWS

With thanks to God for the generosity of all who supported the parish's August fundraiser at the Saratoga Golf and Polo Club, we are pleased to move forward with two important projects in our historic church building.

1) Hear, hear! Bethesda will soon install a hearing loop to assist all persons with hearing aids. The loop will be installed on the interior perimeter of the Nave and Sanctuary, and will allow greater clarity of all audible elements, both spoken and musical. The contractor has been selected with the help of our architects, so we are assured of the highest quality and reasonable cost.

2) See, see! The Vestry has decided to move forward to install protective glazing on the windows on the north side of the church (Washington Street side). Lamb Studios will do the work, which will include protection for the three Tiffany angels in the gallery. Visibility of these treasures will be greatly improved, as well as their future safety.

Total cost of these projects will be about \$20,000 to \$25,000, divided between the proceeds of the August fundraiser and funds from Bethesda's Capital Campaign. Both the Building Committee and Vestry determined that these projects represented a prudent balance of accessibility enhancement and historic value.

Your generosity has allowed Bethesda to proceed with these two initial pieces of our renovation of our beautiful, historic sacred house of worship. Your continued giving toward Bethesda's Capital Campaign will enable us to take the next steps in restoring the church as well as building the new Parish House and Community Center.


