

The First Lesson Isaiah 9:1-4

There will be no gloom for those who were in anguish. In the former time he brought into contempt the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the latter time he will make glorious the way of the sea, the land beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the nations.

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness -- on them light has shined.

You have multiplied the nation, you have increased its joy;

they rejoice before you as with joy at the harvest, as people exult when dividing plunder.

For the yoke of their burden, and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian.

### The Second Lesson

1 Corinthians 1:10-18

Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there are quarrels among you, my brothers and sisters. What I mean is that each of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to Cephas," or "I belong to Christ." Has Christ been divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, so that no one can say that you were baptized in my name. (I did baptize also the household of Stephanas; beyond that, I do not know whether I baptized anyone

else.) For Christ did not send me to baptize but to proclaim the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom, so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its power. For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

The Holy Gospel

Matthew 4:12-23

Celebrant People The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. Matthew. **Glory be to thee, O Lord.** 

When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what had been spoken through the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: "Land of Zebulun, land of Naphtali, on the road by the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles—the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned." From that time Jesus began to proclaim, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."

As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him.

Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people.

We do earnestly repent, and are heartily sorry for these our misdoings; the remembrance of them is grievous unto us, the burden of them is intolerable. Have mercy upon us, have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may ever hereafter serve and please thee in newness of life, to the honor and glory of thy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



### *The Celebrant continues with the Proper Preface:*

It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks unto thee, O Lord, holy Father, almighty, everlasting God. Because in the mystery of the Word made flesh, thou hast caused a new light to shine in our hearts, to give the knowledge of thy glory in the face of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we laud and magnify thy glorious name, evermore praising thee and saying:



### All kneel.

All glory be to thee, O Lord our God, for that thou didst create heaven and earth, and didst make us in thine own image; and, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to take our nature upon him, and to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption. He made there a full and perfect sacrifice for the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took bread; and when he had given thanks to thee, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." Likewise, after supper, he took the cup; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink this, all of you; for this is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins. Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me."

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, we thy people do celebrate and make, with these thy holy gifts which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; and looking for his coming again with power and great glory. And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us, and, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, to bless and sanctify these gifts of bread and wine, that they may be unto us the Body and Blood of thy dearly-beloved Son Jesus Christ.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, whereby we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies. Grant, we beseech thee, that all who partake of this Holy Communion may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, and be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction; and also that we and all thy whole Church may be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. **Amen**.

# **Annual Meeting Vote**

Please be advised that on Sunday 29 January, 2023, there will be **one service at 9.00am**, immediately followed by our **Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Election**. At that time, we will be electing a Junior Warden, and five members of the Vestry, one of whom will also serve a two-year term as Treasurer, and another who will also serve a two-year term as Clerk. Additionally, the meeting will include reports on finance, the ratification of our 2023 budget, and an update on current building work. This year, we will also be voting on certain proposed amendments to the Parish by-laws which have been recommended by the Vestry. Those recommendations will be submitted to the Parish for ratification at the above Annual Meeting and Annual Election. If those recommendations are so ratified by the Parish, the proposed amendments would not take effect until next year's Annual Meeting and Annual Election. The proposed amendments are printed (opposite) for your review.

# PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO CERTAIN BYLAWS OF BETHESDA EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SARATOGA SPRINGS, NEW YORK

On motion duly made and seconded at a meeting of the Vestry of Bethesda Episcopal Church, Saratoga Springs, New York (Article 13 of the Parish Bylaws reciting that "the Wardens, Treasurer and Clerk, together with the Rector, and the Vestrypersons shall constitute the Vestry of the Parish") called for the following purposes and held on January 11, 2023, a quorum being present, the following Resolutions were unanimously approved by vote of the members of the Vestry present and voting at that meeting, at least three days' notice of such meeting having been given to each member of the Vestry by the Rector in writing, either personally or by mail:

### BE IT RESOLVED,

That the Vestry hereby recommends that Article 4, Section 4.2 of the Parish Bylaws, entitled "Vestrypersons," which presently reads: "There shall be nine additional vestrypersons. Two or more members of the same household or family shall not serve concurrently on the Vestry," be amended to read: "There shall be six additional vestrypersons (such six, the "At Large Vestrypersons" or the "Vestrypersons"). Wherever the capitalized term "Vestrypersons" appears in these Bylaws, it shall be deemed to refer to the At Large Vestrypersons. Two or more members of the same household or family shall not serve concurrently on the Vestry;"

### AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,

That the Vestry hereby recommends that Article 5, Section 5.1 of the Parish Bylaws, entitled "Elections," which presently reads:

"Officers and Vestrypersons shall be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Parish. Wardens, Treasurer, Clerk and Delegates shall hold office until the second Annual Meeting following their election. Vestrypersons shall hold office until the third Annual Meeting following their election. All shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualify.

At the Annual Meeting after which this Article takes effect, three Vestrypersons shall be elected to hold office for three years. Vestrypersons and Wardens elected prior to the adoption of these Bylaws [January 18, 2017] shall be considered valid and shall continue the terms to which they were originally elected;"

### be amended to read:

"Officers (defined in Article 4, Section 4.1 of the Parish Bylaws as being comprised of two Wardens, a Treasurer, an Assistant Treasurer if one is desired, and a Clerk) and Vestrypersons shall be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Parish. Wardens, Treasurer and Clerk shall hold office until the second Annual Meeting following their election, provided that in accordance with and in the manner prescribed in Section 45 of the N.Y. Religious Corporations Law (as such Section 45 has been amended from time to time) the terms of office of the two Wardens shall be staggered so that only one Warden shall be elected annually. Except as may otherwise be prescribed in said Section 45, or if applicable, Section 44, of the N.Y. Religious Corporations Law (as such Sections 45 and 44 have been or may hereafter be amended from time to time) respecting the terms of office for which Vestrypersons are required to be elected at the first annual election following an Annual Meeting at which the Parish has determined to change the number of Vestrypersons, Vestrypersons shall hold office until the third Annual Meeting following their election. Officers and Vestrypersons shall all hold office until their successors are elected and qualify."
