Amen.



The Celebrant continues with the Proper Preface:

It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks unto thee, O Lord, holy Father, almighty, everlasting God. Because in the mystery of the Word made flesh, thou hast caused a new light to shine in our hearts, to give the knowledge of thy glory in the face of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we laud and magnify thy glorious name, evermore praising thee and saying:

All glory be to thee, O Lord our God, for that thou didst create heaven and earth, and didst make us in thine own image; and, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to take our nature upon him, and to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption. He made there a full and perfect sacrifice for the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

For in the night in which he was betrayed, he took bread; and when he had given thanks to thee, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." Likewise, after supper, he took the cup; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink this, all of you; for this is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins. Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me."

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, we thy people do celebrate and make, with these thy holy gifts which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; and looking for his coming again with power and great glory. And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us, and, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, to bless and sanctify these gifts of bread and wine, that they may be unto us the Body and Blood of thy dearly-beloved Son Jesus Christ.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, whereby we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies. Grant, we beseech thee, that all who partake of this Holy Communion may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, and be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction; and also that we and all thy whole Church may be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. **Amen**.




The Prayer of Humble Access

Contributions to Bethesda's **Special Monthly Envelope** in February will support the work of the **Franklin Community Center**. Located in downtown Saratoga Springs but serving all of Saratoga County, the Franklin Community Center has been providing necessities and essential support to local individuals and families since 1983. All programs and services provided through the Center focus on those in need, regardless of race, religion or color, to improve their quality of life: for example, operating *Project Lift*, a free after-school prevention program for qualifying children at local schools; or *Franklin Community Manor* which provides safe and affordable rental housing to low-income adults. From Monday to Thursday, the Community Center also runs a *Food Pantry*, and a *Donation Center* which offers clothing and household items. Thank you for supporting our friends at Franklin Community Center and their excellent work in our community.

Lenten Devotions: Week of Ash Wednesday

Each Sunday, a different devotion for the week will be printed in the service sheet, with suggested daily readings.

Introduction

Lent begins in church with the imposition of ashes as a sign of our mortality and penitence for our sins. As we receive the ashes, we hear the words 'Remember, that thou art dust, and unto dust thou shalt return (Genesis 3:19). The ashes are imposed in the form of a cross, pointing to our great hope in the grace of God through the Cross of Christ, which grants us a share in the power of his Resurrection. There are two services on Ash Wednesday this year: 12 Noon and 7pm.

Traditionally, the church has fasted from all food on Ash Wednesday to remind us that our physical hunger for food points to our greater spiritual hunger for God. If you are unable to fast for the entire day, then consider eliminating a meal, or avoiding snacking in between meals.

The Weekday devotions following Ash Wednesday (below) focus on the story of the Creation and Fall. According to the book of Genesis, when God acts, he first creates the light. This light dispels the void of emptiness and formlessness and brings creation into being. God later creates two great sources of light which organise time and the seasons, and make human life possible. This light will be fulfilled in the light of Christ which transforms, enhances, and restores human life.

God creates man and woman in his image and places them in a garden where they will have fellowship with him and all they need. Man and woman, however, are tempted, and they succumb to temptation and disobey God's one command. By disobedience they alienate themselves from God and by that alienation are expelled from the garden into the world where toil, frustration, and mortality will be theirs.

Daily Devotion (beginning Thursday)

Invocation: In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Opening Praver (said daily)

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing you have made and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent: Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our brokenness, may obtain from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
