Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ according to St Mark
People **Glory be to thee, O Lord.**

On the first day of Unleavened Bread, when the Passover lamb is sacrificed, his disciples said to him, ‘Where do you want us to go and make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?’ So he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, ‘Go into the city, and a man carrying a jar of water will meet you; follow him, and wherever he enters, say to the owner of the house, “The Teacher asks, Where is my guest room where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?” He will show you a large room upstairs, furnished and ready. Make preparations for us there.’ So the disciples set out and went to the city, and found everything as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover meal. While they were eating, he took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it, gave it to them, and said, ‘Take; this is my body.’ Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, and all of them drank from it. He said to them, ‘This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. Truly I tell you, I will never again drink of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God.’ When they had sung the hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives.



Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, we thy people do celebrate and make, with these thy holy gifts which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; and looking for his coming again with power and great glory. And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us, and, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, to bless and sanctify these gifts of bread and wine, that they may be unto us the Body and Blood of thy dearly-beloved Son Jesus Christ.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, whereby we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies.

Grant, we beseech thee, that all who partake of this Holy Communion may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, and be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction; and also that we and all thy whole Church may be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. **Amen.**

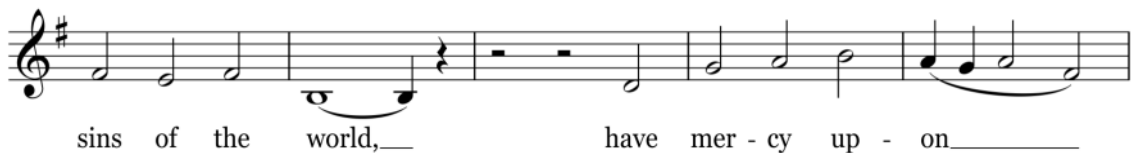

A classically trained soprano, Jean has studied Geneseo under the direction of William Leyerle and Dr. Pamela Kurau, Anne Z. Turner and Michael Clement.

Upon her arrival in the Capital Region 25 years ago, Jean became a member of Albany Pro Musica where she has been a frequent soloist in such things as the Bach *Magnificat*, Britten's *A Ceremony of Carols*, Handel's *Messiah*, McCullough's *Song of the Shulamite*, and most recently Beethoven's *Mass in C Major*. She has been a guest soloist with the Oneida Area Civic Chorale, the St. John's UUC Music Series, Schenectady's Octavo Singers, and Musicians of Ma'alwyck and has presented recitals for the St. Paul's *Tuesdays at Noon* concert series, the Bethlehem Public Library Friends of the Library Music Series, and the First Friday Music Series at First Reformed Church of Schenectady.

In addition to maintaining an active soloist schedule, Jean's stage credits include various roles in productions of *Pippin*, *Quilters*, *The Gondoliers*, *Yeoman of the Guard*, and *A Funny Thing Happened On the Way to the Forum*, and *Aleda, The Flight of the Suffbird Women* with the Musicians of Ma'alwyck in the spring of 2018. Jean is a cantor at St. Thomas the Apostle Church in Delmar and the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Albany and a member of the High Holy Day choir at Congregation Beth Emeth.

When not on stage or at work as the Chief of Staff at Proctors, her time is spent singing and dancing in the living room or the car, which is quite embarrassing to her three teenage children, Morgan, Kara, and Jack. Her husband, Rob, has learned to roll with it.

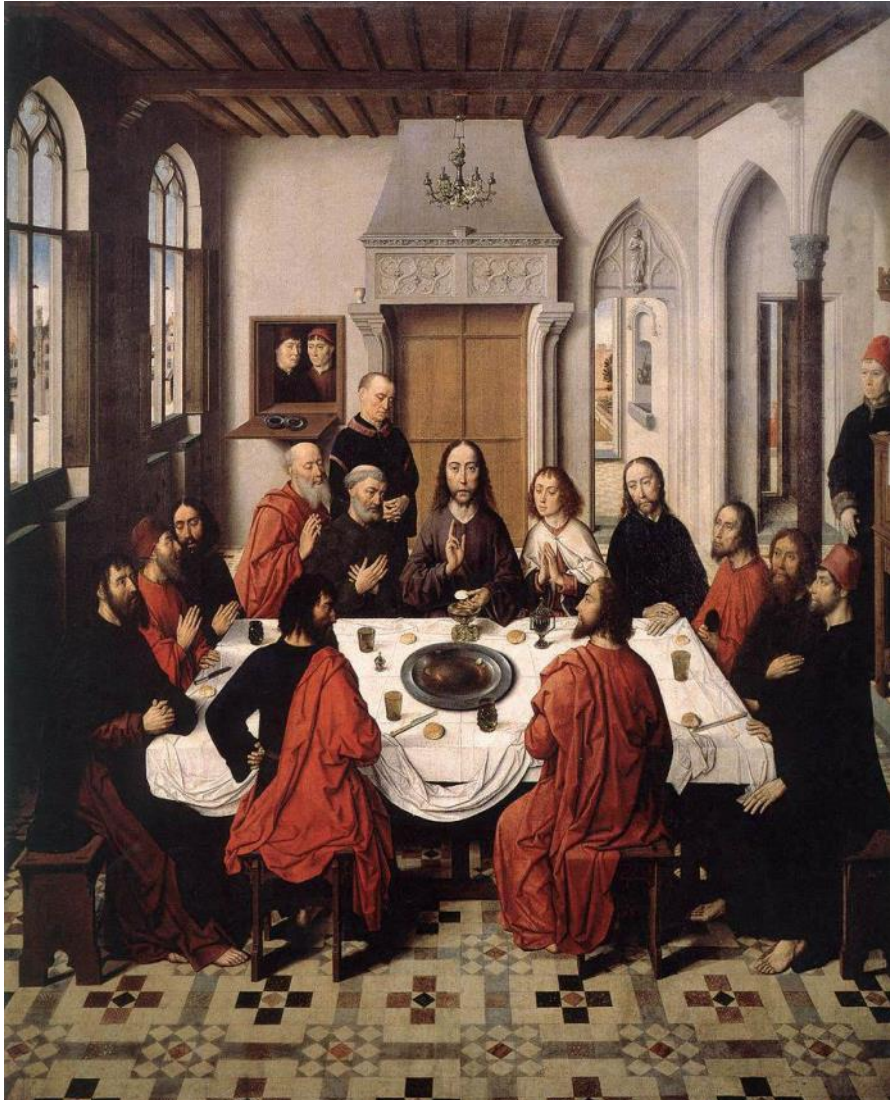
There will be a **Memorial Service** for Bruce Solenski at Bethesda Church on Saturday, 16th September at 10.30am.
