

The Lesson

Isaiah 5.1-7

Let me sing for my beloved my love-song concerning his vineyard: My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill. He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines; he built a watchtower in the midst of it, and hewed out a wine vat in it; he expected it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes.

And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard. What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it? When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes?

And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard. I will remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured; I will break down its wall, and it shall be trampled down. I will make it a waste; it shall not be pruned or hoed, and it shall be overgrown with briers and thorns; I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it.

For the vineyard of the LORD of hosts is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are his pleasant planting; he expected justice, but saw bloodshed; righteousness, but heard a cry!

The Holy Gospel

Matthew 21.33-46

CelebrantThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St Matthew.PeopleGlory be to thee, O Lord.

Jesus said, "Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them, saying, "They will respect my son.' But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance." So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time."

Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the scriptures:

'The stone that the builders rejected

has become the cornerstone;

this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes'?

Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls."

When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.



Financial Overview*, Year-to-Date August 2023

Through August, our financial position is better than budget, and thanks to higher than expected giving during the month of August, our deficit decreased to \$3,844.

In **Expense**, our spending is less than budget by \$24,012, driven primarily by lower Maintenance costs than planned, and some fees. We will incur some of these expected expenses during the fourth quarter of 2023, and this underrun will most likely be reduced.

In year to date **Income**, our regular Pledge and Plate giving is slightly over budget, but less than our expenses by almost \$18,000.

Although this gap is typical, it does mean that we are dependent on generous 4th Quarter giving to close the year and to provide cash to cover expenses during the first months of next year.

*The Operational view excludes items supported by designated funds (eg. Choir and Education programs) and special giving.

2:30 PM: Organ Recital


3:00 PM: Choral Evensong sung by the Cathedral Choir

The Feast of Our Lady of Walsingham is the annual celebration of the covenant relationship between Albany's two cathedrals: the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception and The Cathedral of All Saints.

Evensong is traditionally chanted by the choir and clergy. The service includes psalms, canticles, readings from Old and New Testaments and appointed hymns. The service lasts approximately 50 minutes. Evensong is always free and open to the public.
