When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them. His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.' Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

UPDATED Financial Overview*, Year-to-Date OCTOBER 2023

Through October, our financial position remains better than budget, though our deficit is now over \$12,000. We will be dependent on special late-year gifts to close our deficit and provide cash for the early part of 2024. Year-to-date October, our <u>spending</u> is less than budget by \$20,472, driven primarily by lower Maintenance costs than planned, and lower fees. In YTD Income, our regular Pledge and Plate <u>giving</u> is slightly over budget, but is less than our expenses by over \$30,000.
