

# The Holy Gospel

Mark 1:21-28

*Celebrant People* The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St Mark **Glory be to thee, O Lord.** 

Jesus and his disciples went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have

you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God."






#### The Prayer of Humble Access

# Looking Ahead

**Ash Wednesday** this year falls on 14 February. There will be liturgies will at 12.10pm and 7pm.

**Midweek Service in Lent** A midweek service (Communion or Midday Prayers) will be held on Thursdays at 12.10pm beginning 15 February.

# <u>Meet The Gesimas</u>

This Sunday has traditionally been referred to as *Septuagesima*, the first of the three Sundays before Lent that make up the season of *Shrovetide*. From at least the 8th century until the liturgical reforms following Vatican II in the mid-20<sup>th</sup> c., the three Sundays before Ash Wednesday were known, respectively, as *Septuagesima*, *Sexagesima*, *and Quinquagesima*, meaning 70, 60, and 50 days [before Easter]. Obviously, these numbers don't reflect reality; there are actually 64 days from Septuagesima to Easter Day, and of course a week is 7 days, not 10. But who's counting?! Early churchmen used creative license to create a devotional parallel to the Old Testament story of the Babylonian Captivity of Israel, which lasted roughly 70 years (see II Kings 24-25; Ezra 1).

The purpose of Shrovetide was to prepare the faithful for Lent and thus also for Easter. "Shrove" is the past tense of the medieval English word 'shrive', meaning 'to confess (to)', referring to one of the original intentions of the pre-Lent season. This practice has also been lost; Shrovetide has been replaced by the thoroughly secular Carnival, a time to cut loose before the rigours of Lent. Though Shrovetide was not an extension of Lent, our Christian forebears understood that, psychologically, we don't do well if we leap right from one season to another without a transition period. Think of it as exercise: just as you stretch before you go for a run so you won't injure yourself, Shrovetide allows you to warm up your spiritual muscles before Lent arrives.

Although traces of 'Shrovetide' survive in some of our opening prayers (or collects) at the Eucharist for the later Sundays of the Epiphany season, the late-20th-century revisions to the lectionary all but wiped out its active observance, and by shifting the focus of the last Sunday before Ash Wednesday to the story of Jesus' Transfiguration, created an even more jarring transition to Lent! The shock value of this abrupt shift may be spiritually effective in its own way, but it's still a good idea to give ourselves time to prepare for Lent. So, think about what you might want to read, give up, or take up, or where to focus your prayer life, during this season. For example...

Bethesda finished 2023 in good financial order. We ended with an Operational surplus (positive Net Income), which will help us through the early months of 2024 when we expect to run a deficit.

Our expenses were under budget, primarily due to less maintenance spending than planned. Our Income was over budget thanks to generous donations.
