Silence is observed before the service. All stand as the Choir and Clergy enter. The Celebrant says the Sentences from the Burial Office.

I am the resurrection and the life, saith the Lord: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die.

Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you.

I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth.

Have mercy upon us, have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may ever hereafter serve and please thee in newness of life, to the honor and glory of thy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Celebrant: Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of his great mercy hath promised forgiveness of sins to all those who with hearty repentance and true faith turn unto him, have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**


Lift up your hearts.

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of thy dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we, thy humble servants, do celebrate and make here before thy divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; rendering unto thee most hearty thanks for the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same.

And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us; and of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

Remember, Lord, also the souls of thy servants which are gone before us with the mark of faith, and now rest in the sleep of peace... (*The tower bell tolls for the departed.*) We beseech thee, O Lord, that unto them, and unto all such as rest in Christ, thou wilt grant a place of refreshing, of light, and of peace. And vouchsafe to give unto us some portion and fellowship with thy holy Apostles and Martyrs and with all thy Saints; within whose fellowship we beseech thee to admit us.

And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice, yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord; By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. **Amen.**

Liturgical Notes

Q In the Prayers of the People at the Sunday Eucharist, we remember those "whose **year's mind** falls at this time." What is the derivation of that phrase?

A Although the phrase was common centuries ago, it now survives only in Church ritual. In this context, 'mind' is a reference to remembrance or commemoration. It is a relative of phrases like the old English proverb, out of sight, out of mind, or the idiom, to call to mind, which gives us a clue why mind is equated with memory. It survives in this ecclesiastical phrase to refer to an act of commemoration of a departed soul on the anniversary of his or her death.

Until the Reformation in the 16th century, the Church was clear that there was no 'end date' on the need to remember the faithful departed in our prayers. The wealthy even built Chantry Chapels in order that prayers for their own souls would go on until the end of time. In the Roman Catholic Church, people can still pay to have masses said for the departed on or near their year's mind.

Another meaningful and lasting way to remember someone is with a memorial gift supporting a particular ministry or project. In 2024, Bethesda received a gift from the estate of Bruce Solenski, a faithful member of this parish. In accordance with Bruce's wishes, this fund is to be used for the upkeep of the sanctuary and to purchase items needed for worship: candles, vestments, vessels, *etc*. As we remember Bruce at the altar today, we pray that his generous gift will benefit our church for years to come. May his soul and the souls of all the faithful departed, rest in peace.
